Letter from the President and the Executive Director

Dear Friends and Supporters


The year of 2006 offered both challenges and opportunities for Presbyterian Outreach. It was necessary to restructure the programs and services offered and strengthen the core infrastructure of the organization.

The restructuring resulted in no longer offering group art and music lessons through School of the Arts[®]. Rather, a concentration was given to offer an increased service level for School of the Arts[®] Behind Bars, where we partner with the Nebraska Correctional Youth Facility to provide art and music lessons to the inmates ages 15 - 19. We also continued sponsoring our music instructor from Poland to provide individual piano lessons.


One challenge was received in late June; two of the three office sites that housed personnel and medical equipment were no longer going to be available to us. By August 1st, we had to find new accommodations for all of the medical equipment and all office personnel. This challenge turned into an opportunity. We were able to move all of the medical equipment and all offices into one location. This promoted teamwork and expanded the hours that people were able to drop in to get medical equipment.

While dealing with these challenges, we were still able to serve over 10,000 individuals and families. The year of 2006 turned out to be a year that further strengthened the organization and prepared us to better meet the needs of the community in the future.

In 2006, we served 10,130 people in the communities within southwestern Iowa and eastern Nebraska. These many hours all were to help individuals attain a greater level of independence and improve their quality of life with a vision to improve lifestyles by obtaining the assistance where needed.

Senior Services

The Senior Services program provides services and resources to homebound adults and caregivers of chronically ill and homebound frail adults. Studies have shown that 65% of older persons with long-term care needs rely exclusively on family and friends to provide assistance. And for those loving caregivers, 63% rate emotional stress and 44% rate financial burden as reasons for their own health decline. The programs of Presbyterian Outreach help decrease this stress.

These services are provided in three areas: Respite Connection, Senior Companion, and Interfaith Volunteer Congregational Care Teams. In 2006, 603 people utilized our Senior Services and 13,725 hours of respite was provided.

Respite Connection

Volunteers spend two to four hours a week with a person whom is homebound and has a family member as a caregiver. The volunteer provides companionship to the homebound individual while giving the caregiver an opportunity to refresh their energy to continue care for their loved-one in their home. The volunteers share their time by reading, recreation, or just visiting with the care-receiver, but do not provide any medically necessary services. All volunteers have mandatory training and background checks to ensure the safety of the families we serve.

With the generosity of the Enrichment Foundation, 23 caregivers were given “Care-Free Baskets.” Baskets were filled with Godiva chocolate, *Chicken Soup for the Caregiver’s Soul* book, a candle, a gift certificate for a massage, a gift certificate to Douglas Theatres, and a gift certificate to Panera’s. The Program Manager and a volunteer personally delivered each basket to the home of the caregiver. The following is a message left by one of the caregivers:

“... I wanted to call and thank you very much for the basket. It is absolutely wonderful! I couldn’t believe it when I looked in there and saw a gift certificate for a massage! I have never had one in my life. I ‘m going to have a “me” day and bring my book. It’s ironic that they make a book for us and I am very anxious to get into it and read the other stories. I can’t thank you enough and I truly appreciate it. It is nice to know that there are people and organizations out there that really care and help us. I do appreciate it and thank you again so much!”

A portion of the funding for the Respite Connection comes to us through United Way of the Midlands.

Senior Companions

The Senior Companion program is funded by the Corporation for National and Community Services. Volunteers who become Senior Companions are over the age of 60 and are on a limited income. The volunteers provide companionship to homebound, frail adults in Pottawattamie County and are given a small stipend for their volunteer service. Senior Companion volunteers will read, make a meal, visit and occasionally give a ride to the doctor’s office. This invaluable program provides a service to both the client and the Senior Companion volunteer.

The appreciation of the services provided by the Senior Companion volunteers is best described through those they serve...

Senior Services

"I don't get so lonely and bored."

"I could not live alone if I didn't have (my Senior Companion). She is a good companion and a friend."

"(My husband's) companion has given me the freedom to be away, yet know that he is very happy visiting with (his Senior Companion)."

Each Senior Companion volunteer must be continuously trained to meet the requirements of the volunteer position. A two-hour training session is scheduled each month. The generosity of many organizations provides speakers to various subjects. A few of the organizations who participated in the training sessions have been: Emergency Management, Creighton Osteoporosis Research Center, Wells Fargo, Municipal Housing, Elder Abuse, and League of Human Dignity.



Interfaith Volunteer Congregational Care Teams

The funding for this project comes to us from the Alegant Health Community Benefit Trust. A trainer visits with various congregations of all faiths to help establish volunteer teams to provide caregiving services. Congregants are already familiar with helping those in need within their congregations. Presbyterian Outreach helps them to formalize further their care in a team environment.

Caregiving in congregations may be given to:

- families with a newborn baby;
- families with a member recovering from a car accident;
- an elderly homebound person with limited mobility; or to
- a family whose life is extremely busy.

Training sessions have been conducted with various religious entities:

- Lutheran
- Catholic
- Presbyterian
- Jewish
- Methodist

Presbyterian Outreach continues services to the organizations by being a resource for elder and family needs.

Health and medical Equipment Loan Program (HELP)

This program provides durable medical equipment and soft goods to individuals who need the equipment to improve their quality of life. Individuals who do not have medical insurance, Medicare, Medicaid or available income can utilize the program by loaning the equipment for up to one year and paying a low processing fee. In addition, individuals utilize the program when there is a short-term need for the equipment, such as a knee or hip replacement or recovery from an illness or accident. The program is available to all those in need regardless of race, gender, age, religion or economic status.

Presbyterian Outreach partners with area health organizations from across Nebraska and western Iowa to ensure that the people in need are aware of the availability of equipment. In 2006, 6,155 individuals were helped by the Health and medical Equipment Loan Program (HELP).

"I appreciate and thank you and your organization so much for getting my father [the equipment] he needs" recounts the daughter of a 90+ year old man who suffers from arthritis so severe that he was unable to feed himself prior to receiving help from our services.

"We are so happy to have found you! Having to buy the equipment for only a six-week recovery time just didn't make sense to us. I'm so glad the physical therapist referred us to your organization," reports the husband of a middle-aged woman who fell in an accident.

Not only does this program help those who need the equipment, but it also helps the communities by accepting the donation of equipment, thus keeping these materials out of area refuse sites. In addition, wheelchairs and scooters that are beyond our ability to repair are then donated to Hope Haven, which is an international non-profit organization that renovates and provides equipment to third-world countries.

A challenge turned into an opportunity when we were no longer able to use the warehouse in Council Bluffs for the Health Equipment Loan Program. All of the Presbyterian Outreach locations are now in one place: 8447 Lake Street. This greatly benefits the HELP program by being able to staff the program fully from 10:00a.m. to 5:30p.m. Previously, the walk-in portion of the program had to shut down at 2:00 each day so staff could drive the deliveries.

In addition, through the generous donation from the Adah and Leon Millard Foundation, we were able to obtain a delivery van.

Deliveries of medical equipment had been done by a staff vehicle, which limited the number and type of deliveries. The acquisition of a delivery van increased efficiency and now we have scheduled deliveries two days each week: Monday and Thursday afternoons.

School of the Arts®

The School of the Arts® program consists of two programs. One program partners with the Nebraska Correctional Youth Facility (School of the Arts® Behind Bars) and the other program provides individual piano lessons throughout the Omaha/Council Bluffs Metropolitan area

Piano Lessons

A redesign of the School of the Arts® program began in 2006. Individual, rather than group, lessons are provided to those who wish to learn to play piano. Presbyterian Outreach sponsors a very talented piano instructor from Poland, Mirela Mlynska. Mirela teaches the students a vast array of musical culture through her lessons. Her expertise and extensive background in music encompasses not only her native Poland, but also the music of the United States, Japan, Nepal, Columbia, Mexico, and India. Mirela has the special talent of blending elements of music from these cultures into our western musical compositions. She has expertise in understanding and interpreting the demands in the style and nuances of a variety of music from Baroque to modern classical composers.

Mirela has been teaching for 16 years in both Poland and the United States. Lessons are taught at five locations in various neighborhoods. Seventy-three students ranging in ages 4 - 40 received private piano lessons in 2006. Mirela's visa sponsorship with Presbyterian does end September 30, 2007.

School of the Arts Behind Bars

Presbyterian Outreach partners with the Nebraska Correctional Youth Facility (NCYF) to provide visual arts and piano lessons to inmates ages 15 – 19. The goals of this program include: improving self-confidence, decreasing behavioral incidents and the opportunity to acquire praise. This program is a valuable addition to the overall rehabilitation within the facility.

Ms. Asher, NCYF Coordinator wrote this:

There is a sense of peace and security that pervades the art and music rooms. The inmates are mentally and emotionally transported out of their surroundings and into an hour of rewarding accomplishment. I don't know how to describe it to you, but they are in a sense, being permitted to go back to childhood to have opportunities that they never got to experience.

Ms. Detter, Piano Instructor, wrote this about her first experience of teaching at the facility:

Despite my being in the music profession for 20 years, I was a little nervous about taking this position. I arrived not knowing what to expect. My first student was a delight and was very eager to learn. My fear subsided as I saw his intense desire to play the piano. For an entire hour, I instructed him in the basics and was able to teach him to play 3 songs. To see his expression of joy on his face, and the feeling of accomplishment he had of himself, gave me a warm smile. Perhaps music could be an avenue of great joy in his life, and lead to more positive endeavors in the future.

Our visual arts instructor, Ms. Stoll, worked several months with the inmates in creating a positive mural in the hallway to the cafeteria. The mural is titled "Put Your Mind to It...Sky's the Limit." The inmates were involved with the project from the planning stages all through to the final strokes of paint. The students learned to work as a group, take positive criticism of their work, and how to compromise. Over 20 inmates participated on this project.

Overall, the School of the Arts® Behind Bars served 142 students with visual arts and piano lessons in 2006. The Warden of the facility wrote, "We have been fortunate to have highly skilled and dedicated assistance in this area from Presbyterian Outreach."

The Nebraska Arts Council, a state agency, has supported this arts event through its matching grants program funded by the Nebraska Legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency. For more information, visit www.nebraskartscouncil.org.

Presbyterian Outreach, Inc. Projects

Presbyterian Outreach continues to support two projects, which one has been in existence since the inception of the organization: Camp Scholarships to Camp Calvin Crest and Christmas Stockings for the Incarcerated.

Camp Scholarships

This project has been in existence since the inception of the organization, October 1982. Presbyterian Outreach and its many supporters, including the Lozier Foundation, provides camp scholarships to low income/at-risk youth in grades 5 through 8 to enable them to experience attending a summer camp. This benefit goes beyond giving the child a wonderful experience; it also gives the parent or guardian a much needed break!

In 2006, 82 children were able to attend camp that would not have been able to otherwise. This was the first year we partnered with The Hope Center to provide a day-camp experience for children who were unable to attend for a full week.

As a part of the application process, the children included a short essay. The essay was a two-part essay:

- 1) What does your neighborhood need to make it a better place to live? For example, something that would make your neighborhood more fun, safe, clean, etc. Be creative!
- 2) What would you do to help your neighbors and how would you do it?

The answers received were creative, youthful in their context and quite insightful:

Our neighborhood needs to have more block parties, so the neighbors can get to know each other.

I make May baskets for my neighbors.

If people could stop shooting around my house it would be safer.

Maybe I can help play games with the little kids.

Maybe we can start a basketball team on my block.

I can help my neighbors by getting a good education.

I would get a group of teens to start a "Teen Clean Gang."

I would plant a tree so there would be more oxygen on the block.

My friends and I have actually talked to City Council about building a skate-park.

There should be a certain length that your grass should be and what the lawns should look like.

To help single parents I could offer a free babysitting service to them.



It is with hope that these children will take to heart that they have ownership in their neighborhoods. Perhaps a few will take steps to help a neighbor or go the length to make a positive change in their neighborhood.

Christmas Stockings

Volunteers sew thousands of Christmas stockings each holiday season for this project. Presbyterian Outreach, with the help of many more volunteers, then fills the stockings with personal hygiene items, small snacks, and motivational materials. The filled stockings are given to incarcerated individuals through southwestern Iowa and eastern Nebraska. This small gift is sometimes the only “good-tidings” an inmate may receive during the holiday.

Here is how we impact the lives of these individuals:

“As of right now, I’m doing 45 days in solitary confinement for fighting. I received a stocking last year also, but it didn’t affect me as much as it did this year. When the guard came around and gave it to me and I looked inside and read your card, I broke down and started crying. I haven’t cried since I was a little kid, and yet, here I cry over a piece of material with some food items stuffed inside. I guess it’s because somebody actually showed some kind of love for me.”

“I would like to thank you all for the stockings we received on Christmas Eve. I don’t think that I can possibly put into words how much this meant to me. The snacks were wonderful, but the fact that people took the time to make these and put them together for us will touch my life forever. I am in prison for taking from people I don’t know. And your giving to me, someone you don’t even know. Thank you!”



The number of stockings delivered was 3,075. In addition to delivering stockings to the correctional facilities, we partnered with Woodrow Wilson Junior High School (Council Bluffs). Students encouraged donations of their own to fill the stockings and gave 200 to the residents of Micah House.

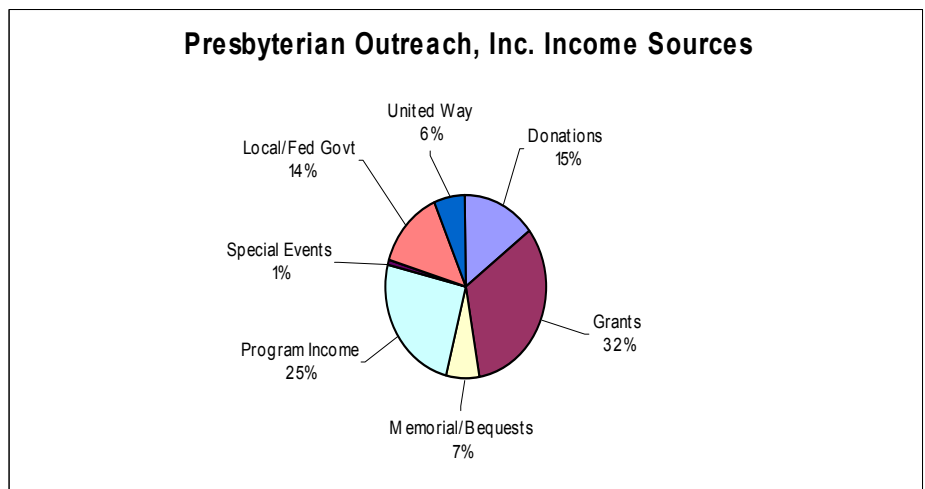
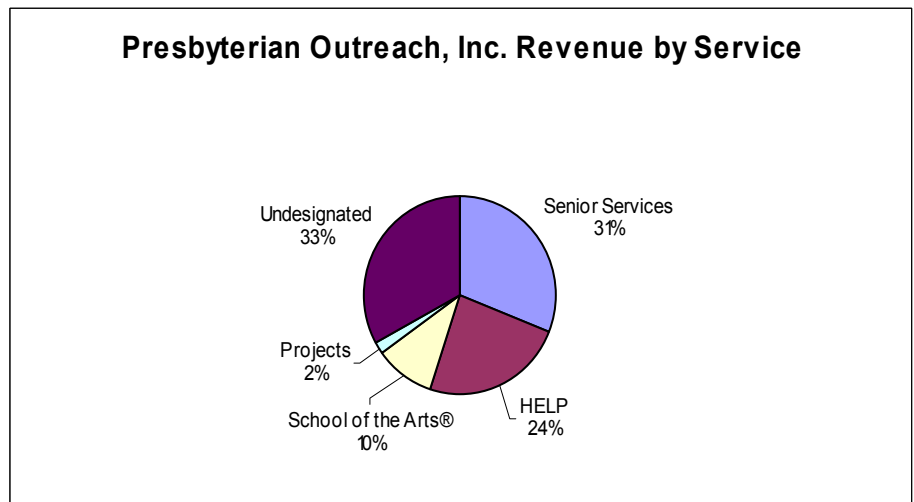
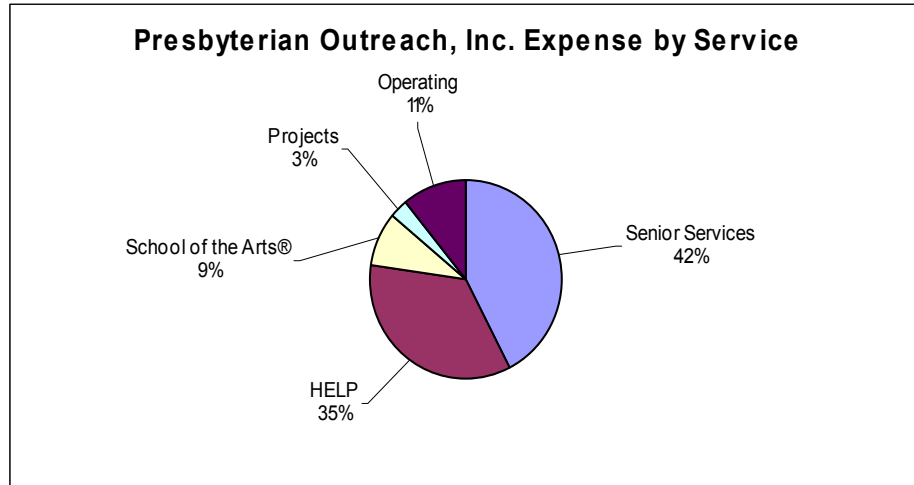
